It is a busy season in Area 6 for umpiring this season with some great opportunities for some of our umpires.

From a Registration point of view, Area 6 has increased their registration this year with the recruitment of younger Peewee aged umpires....We are looking for some more Adult umpires (parents) in the area as that portion of our registration has dwindled due to retirements, relocation or work commitments.

In April, Kamloops hosted the BC version of the National Umpire Clinic which was attended by our Province's National Members and a few selected Level 3 umpires who are trying to enter into the National Program.

In May, Kamloops hosted two Golden Baseball Exhibition games between the Victoria Seals and the Defending League Champs, the Calgary Vipers. The Golden Baseball League is a Independent Professional league with teams out of the United States and Mexico - except for three Canadian Teams (Calgary, Edmonton and Victoria). 3 BCBUA umpires were asked to umpire the 2 games. Chris Connelly, Kris Hartley, and Josh Kennelly. Hopefully, Kamloops will get a franchise in the next couple of years. Those three umpires and Steve Boutang umpired the CCBC College National Championship hosted by Thompson Rivers University. It was a good weekend overall with the host committee & League Representative very happy with the umpiring. Thompson Rivers University was selected to be the host of this National Championship for the next two years so there should be more opportunities for BCBUA members to work this event!

Looking toward to the rest of summer, Kamloops has a few more baseball events to host. Kamloops is hosting 3 Provincial Championships in July and August. The Junior Provincials, Midget AAA is July 30^{th} – August 2^{nd} and Peewee AAA is August $5^{th} - 8^{th}$.

On the administration side of things (besides being the Area Representative), I am the allocator of umpires for Bantam AAA, Midget AAA, Sr. Men's, and College (Thompson Rivers University) in Kamloops. As well, this season, I took over from Richard Christie as the Umpire Allocator for the only Canadian team in the West Coast Baseball League, the Kelowna Falcons.

Calling balls and strikes is simple. Any trained monkey can eventually do this. What separates the good umpires from the average umpires is when you can develop a solid strike zone that is consistent through the course of the game from the first pitch until the final out. And I'm talking about being consistently competent. It is all fine and well to be consistent, but if you are calling pitches strikes that are in a batter's eyes all the time, you are not competent. You have to learn to be good at both.

The following tips on Consistency include exerts from a recent article

in Referee Magazine....

Consistency is the foundation of an official's credibility. But because officials see the game differently from coaches or spectators, our definition of consistency differs as well. Consistency is virtually impossible to measure. Statistics don't always tell the truth either. Stats might be useful to an evaluator but they are not indicative of an official or a crew's level of consistency.

To be effective, an official must be capable of something called competent consistency. Consistency from game to game is related to the ability to concentrate on the task at hand. This can be difficult for officials who are working beer league baseball, blow out games, or for those who run to the park and get changed in the parking lot as they run to the field. But to work at a high level, concentration skills are a must.

It is easier for an umpire to develop consistency when umpiring at the same level game in and game out.

Officials working at amateur levels often find themselves jumping

It was a treat for me in that I was able to step onto an MLB field before even seeing my first live MLB game, and we were treated so well by Steve Brooks of the Blue Jays, who toured us through the facility, allowed us to take pictures and video that will help in preparations for the 2011 WBC, introduced us to Paul Beeston, Alex Anthopoulos, Tony LaCava and Michael Volpatti, and hosted us for two Jays wins over the Texas Rangers. I was also able to leave with a bat autographed by Vernon Wells, and managed to fit in a trip to the Hockey Hall of Fame. After those meetings, it is quite clear the Blue Jays organization is in tremendous hands and we may well see a return to glory sooner rather than later.

BCBUA MEMBERSHIP RISES:

BCBUA Secretary George Smith reports that 2010 membership is up nearly 25% from last year. Preliminary numbers indicate that BCBUA has 1478 members this year, an increase over the 1180 reported in 2009. There are significant reasons this is the case, including the addition of new members from associations who had previously not utilized BCBUA for their education and clinics. Further, the associations that have always used BCBUA for our services had a small increase in most cases. This can be attributed to good work that local UIC's and Area Reps are doing to promote umpiring in this province.

President John Berry says he doesn't recall seeing numbers this high, which is very encouraging given the financial burdens associations have taken on with the reduction of Gaming funds.

A historic night took place recently at Kelowna's Elks Stadium when the West Coast League's Kelowna **Falcons defeated the Cowlitz Black** Bears 11-7. There was little significance to the baseball game itself, but for 2 ladies, it was a memorable evening. Kelowna umpires **Kelly Hunter and Siobhan Doherty** made up the league's first ever allfemale umpire crew, with Hunter

acting as the plate umpire. While both umpires have worked in the league previously, it was the first time that they had worked together. It was a historic moment from the league's standpoint, which has been in operation for 6 years.

"I was nervous until the 6th inning" said Hunter.

"It was neat. I was proud of us," added Doherty.

Hunter is a well recognized umpire in the Interior, having recently been selected to umpire at the Women's World Championships this summer. Doherty, a 2009 attendee of the Jim Evans Academy of Umpiring, recently moved in from Calgary. Both are in the Baseball Canada program.

The baseball world lost one of its most recognizable voices in July of this year. New York Yankees Public Address Announcer Bob Sheppard passed away following a lengthy illness. Sheppard was the iconic voice that welcomed fans to the house that Ruth built for 56 years! He started work in 1951 when the lineups of the game between Boston and the Yankees featured greats such as Joe DiMaggio, Yogi Berra, Mickey Mantle, and Ted Williams. He announced an amazing 4500 Yankees games until he retired unwillingly in 2007. He passed away at the age of 99!

Stump the Ump Answer from Spring 2010 by Brian Cargnelli

So here is a recap of the question. If a player who has been ejected from a game is due up in the batting order and no one else is available to take that players place due to injury or other ejections, who is the correct batter. In the scenario I outlined in the last issue this was exactly the case and it resulted in a batting out of order protest.

As one of the umpires on the field we ruled that the player next up in the batting order was the correct batter as we believed that the player who was ejected from the game is just skipped for their turn at bat. Now some of you would say that once a team doesn't have 9

players in the line-up the game is over, but as I pointed out in the last issue that is actually not the case. It's only when a team cannot "FIELD" 9 players that the forfeit take place. In the scenario that I outlined, the game situation was bottom of 7, home team at bat and trailing 5-4 when the protest comes into play regarding the batting out of order.

Well just like the other protest, our As an aside, the team that we had committee. It is not a batting out of order if the player in question happens to be on base when he is next legally due to come to bat so the interpretation was exactly the

same here. How could a player who is due to come to bat also be on the bases though? Good question. What if somehow a Batting out of Order (BOO) happens that legalizes incorrect batters so that the next person up is also on base. The rules actually stipulate that in this case you skip the person who should be up and go to the next legal batter. Same as our situation.

decision was upheld by the protest ejected all of the players finally got a call in their favour. Was that enough to show them that we umpires actually knew what we were doing. Nope, they argued that too. Guess we can never win.

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from one level to another, perhaps handling a peewee game one day and a Premier League game the next.

All of these factors can make achieving consistency more difficult.

Experienced umpires will tell you that you have to develop a balance and a style to suit each division. What will the players and coaches expect and accept out of you depending on what level you are working.

The strike zone is a perfect example. For a mosquito or peewee game, the plate umpire will probably give at least a ball or 2 on the corners of the plate. At the Midget or Premier level, the ball has to be

touching the plate to be a strike.

You also have to forget about friendships. We don't live in a vacuum. We develop friendships with players and coaches. That's a fact. But when we go on the field, it is important to treat everyone the same. That's part of consistency. Players and coaches will know this when they see it.

If you show that you are friendly on the field with coaches and players, the opposition –who may not know you – will have a preconceived notion that you are a homer. There will be a lack of trust there.

The ability to handle situations while still being able to maintain a high level of consistency will differentiate the extraordinary official from the merely capable ones.

If we can learn to handle the same

situation the same way every time, it's going to come across to people the same.

A good example of this would be to remember this when coaches and players are yelling at you.... "believe what you see". Just because people are hollering doesn't mean you are wrong! Have confidence in what you see.

Do not respond emotionally or start flipping imaginary coins to make calls. Coaches often question umpires so that they can "get the next call".

The question of whether consistency is a natural attribute or a skill acquired over time may never be completely answered. But maintaining your own personal consistency will improve your game no matter what level you work.
